For over 136 years, we have been dedicated to ensuring that all children have the chance to access high-quality programs that will enhance their lives and advance their futures.

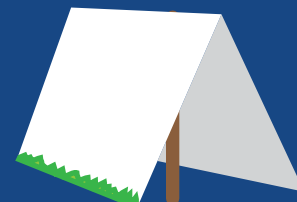

A Bold Change for Germantown

Culminating a seven-year project that began with the launch of our Bold Change for Kids campaign in 2015, Boys & Girls Clubs of Philadelphia celebrated the opening & re-dedication of the Ralph J. Roberts Germantown Boys & Girls Club. Named in honor of Philadelphia business-man and Comcast founder Ralph J. Roberts, the renovated Club began serving youth in the Germantown neighborhood with quality after-school programs and services in June 2022.

The new, 26,000 square foot Clubhouse now includes a Comcast Lift Zone, an art room, a dance and fitness studio, eSports room, Kids Cafe, music room, teen center, literacy center, tech room, STEM room and two gymnasiums. To date, over 220 youth are currently registered at the Club, which provides programming Monday through Saturday for school-aged and teen youth.

The support of Comcast, both through the Bold Change for Kids campaign and through programs such as Comcast's Lift Zone, was instrumental to the completion and success of the Germantown Club renovations. Earlier this year, in partnership with Comcast and Boys & Girls Clubs of America (BGCA), Club members across Philadelphia, including members from the Germantown Club, took part in an inter-club digital playoff series. Club members participated in a coding competition, a collaborative art competition and a typing competition, all designed to allow Club members the ability to use different skills, websites, and online tools to learn how technology can best fit their lives.

The addition of a new Kids Café in the Germantown Club has allowed the expansion of nutrition and health programming to youth in the area. The remodeled and expanded kitchen and cafeteria has given the Club the ability to serve over 11,000 high-quality & nutritious meals to Club members, many of whom come from food-insecure backgrounds.

Since 1887, Boys & Girls Clubs of Philadelphia has been serving young people from throughout the Germantown neighborhood at the Germantown Club. The Club honors Ralph Roberts' commitment to helping improve the lives of others. Robert's history with the Germantown Club traces back more than 70 years when, as a 17-year-old, he served as a counselor to underprivileged boys. His steadfast dedication to community service was passed down to his children and grandchildren, who joined us at the re-dedication.

The Ralph J. Roberts Germantown Boys & Girls Club is a testament to the love and commitment all of you have for Philadelphia's kids who need us the most. Thanks to your generous support, over 7,000 youth who live in the surrounding community will have access to the programs and resources they need to meet their full potential as productive, caring, responsible citizens.

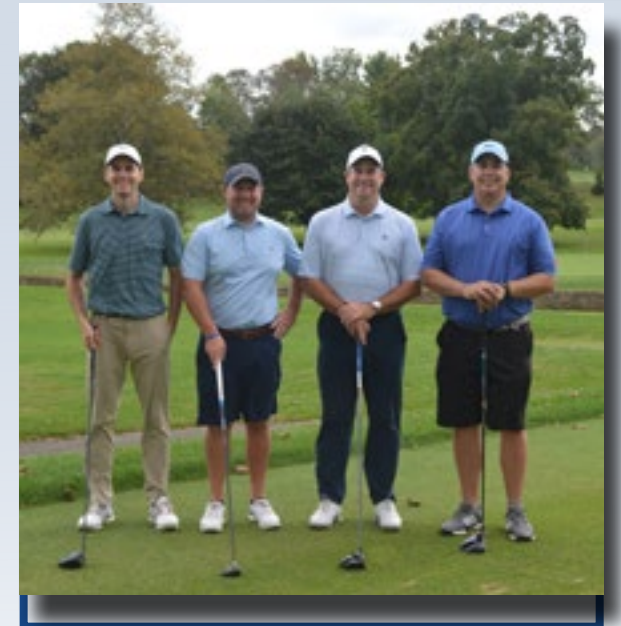
The Michael Champan Memorial Golf Classic

Continuing to Grow Access to Nutritious Meals

Ensuring Club members have access to high-quality, nutritious meals are the primary goal of our Kids Cafe Program. We are proud to continue these efforts with the addition of our fourth Kids Café at Boys & Girls Clubs of Philadelphia. This Spring, we unveiled our newest Kids Café at the Ralph J. Roberts Boys & Girls Clubs in Germantown.

The addition of a Kids Café at the Ralph J. Robert Boys & Girls Club in Germantown will ensure that even when schools and other community resources are closed, the 7,100 youth who live within 1.5 miles of the Club will have access to healthy, home-cooked meals.

Before the remodel of the Germantown Club, the outdated facility lacked the necessary space and equipment to serve our Club members. Now, the Club boasts a state-of-the-art kitchen space, which has the capacity to serve over 300 youth.

Since the Germantown Club reopened, Club members have had access to fresh and nutritious meals. Already, our full-time Chefs have prepared and served over 11,600 meals and snacks to Club members. These meals and snacks all contain fresh ingredients so that the food not only is nutritious, but also tastes good and has the homemade touch to make our Club members feel welcome.

Across the organization, our full-service Kids Cafés at Wissahickon, Wayne Avenue, Northeast Frankford, and Germantown Clubs served over 90,000 meals and over 80,000 snacks to Club members and community youth in 2022.

We are tremendously grateful for the support and generosity of our partners including Leo & Peggy Pierce Family Foundation, W.W. Smith Charitable Trust, and the Scholler Foundation, who helped ensure that we nourished youth and families all year round.

Across the organization, Clubs organized and hosted holiday celebrations and activities designed to reduce food insecurity for families, promote healthy habits among Club members, reduce learning loss and promote academic learning and continue to increase social emotional learning.

We are grateful to all our Champions, in particular PECO and Pacifico Auto Group, who teamed up to provide 100 winter coats to children in the Greater Philadelphia region including Club members from our Shane Victorino Boys & Girls Club. We are also thankful to the Wissahickon Boys & Girls Clubs Advisory Council, which spent the year gathering gifts to allow Club members to go shopping for their families and volunteers from Drexel Medicine and LaSalle University who helped wrap nearly 800 gifts in one afternoon to create a memorable moment for our members.

This year, we were thrilled to welcome back our “Caught Being Good,” campaign to Clubs across Philadelphia.

In 2013, Boys & Girls Clubs began the campaign as a way to recognize Club members who displayed good behavior and leadership throughout the Club. Club members who were observed by staff making positive actions, actively attending and participating in Club programs and who demonstrated acts of leadership at the Club were issued a ticket to be entered into a drawing for the most magical of prizes: an all-expense paid trip to the “Happiest Place on Earth,” Walt Disney World!

Literacy Initiative

Our Call-to-Action Literacy Initiative continued to play a pivotal role in combating pandemic learning loss during the 2021-2022 program year. Throughout the school year, we engaged 649 youth in literacy programming across 11 Clubs, including five school-based Clubs that had been closed by the School District from March 2020-September 2021. Our 2022 Summer Camps engaged 1,120 participants in literacy activities across 12 Clubs. Literacy Supervisors truly embraced the challenges of this year, helping youth stay on-track in school by teaching them critical literacy, social, and emotional skills after school.

While students all throughout Philadelphia are struggling, students in the neighborhoods we serve are considerably further behind. Studies have shown that students from low-income homes suffered more learning loss than others because of schools’ closures during the pandemic. We have witnessed this in our Club youth, as many entered this school year without basic writing skills or phonics knowledge. In response to an increased need for handwriting support, we created a supplementary training on multi-sensory techniques that support handwriting development. Literacy Supervisors then applied the concepts through creative, hands-on activities. By November, many of the children demonstrated significant progress. Throughout the year, Literacy Supervisors also found particularly creative ways to encourage movement as part of the multi-sensory approach. Participants had a high level of engagement and gained necessary practice applying their literacy skills, especially decoding and encoding.

End of year data for the 2021-2022 program year demonstrates that our Call-to-Action Literacy Initiative continues to positively impact participants not just academically but also in their motivations, attitudes towards learning, and social-emotional development. Of youth participants who were tested twice, 48% improved in at least one key indicator area and/or ended the year at or above grade level. Youth saw the greatest gains in their ability to accurately read a passage of grade-level text, with the average accuracy score increasing 4 percentage points from 93% at the beginning of the year to 97% at the end of the year. Site impact reports confirm positive trends in youth behaviors, with Literacy Supervisors reporting noticeable improvements in class participation throughout the year and an increase in youth assisting their peers with literacy tasks.

Throughout 2022 we also expanded our national efforts to support youth literacy, engaging three new partner organizations and offering additional training content. In February 2022, we held a 3-day, live Virtual Refresher Training that allowed returning staff members to revisit and enhance their understanding of multi-sensory literacy techniques, while also delving further into supplementary topics such as supporting middle school youth in literacy. In March 2022, we led a live virtual version of our signature 5-day Multi-sensory Literacy Training, complete with interactive training guides to enhance the virtual format. The post-training survey showed a 100% satisfaction rate, with participants indicating that the training met or exceeded their expectations.

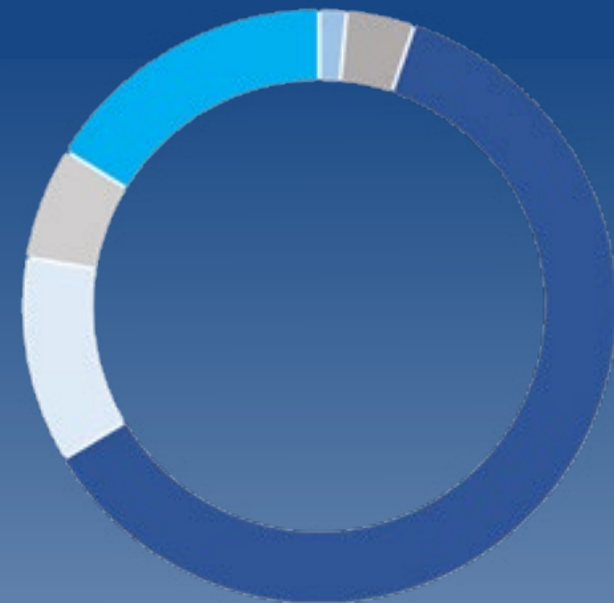

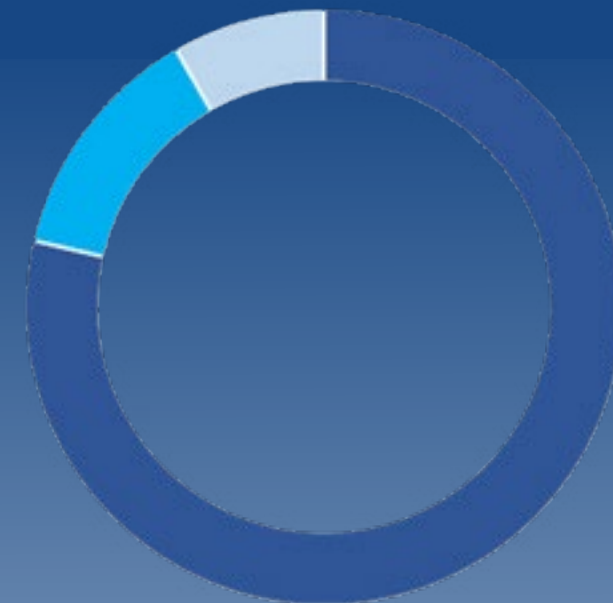

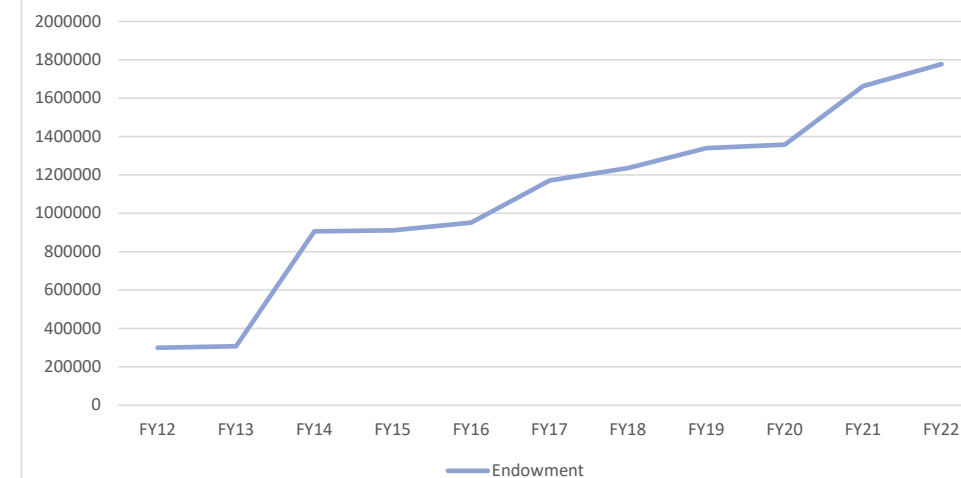
Budget Summary FY13 Vs FY22



Budget Summary FY13 v. FY22

From FY2013 to FY2022 BGCP increased its net assets by over \$11 million. Additionally, BGCP moved from a \$1.2 million operating deficit in FY13 to an average operating surplus of \$1.7 million from FY15 to FY21. During this same time BGCP increased membership by 40%, grew from 12 to 22 locations, added 11 full-time Literacy Supervisors and raised over \$20 Million in Capital funding.

Endowment



From FY2012 to FY2022 BGCP has increased the size of our endowment by more than 500%, ensuring long-term fiscal sustainability.
